Pack & Den Meetings

Monthly Meetings for Pack and Den - Lions and Tiger Scouts should have their parent or guardian attend meetings with them. Parents of wolf scouts and above are not required, but are welcome to stay for meetings.

- Pack Meetings are once a month, typically on Tuesdays or Thursday at 7:15 in Montvale Community Center. See pack calendar for dates.
- Den leaders will set den meeting dates and typically meet monthly.
- Our pack holds several pack-wide events, families are invited to attend with scouts at each of these events.
- Montvale Camp Out Hosted by Troop 33, this event is open to all scouts. Weekend of 9/22
- Bullowa Camp out (Oct) Hosted by Troop 334, open to scouts and families. Weekend of 10/6.
- Pinewood Derby (Jan) Scouts receive their car kits at the December meeting/holiday party. They build their cars (with parent's help) and we race them at the Pinewood Derby in January.
- Blue & Gold Dinner (Feb) Blue and Gold dinner is when Webelos transition to Boy Scouts. Those that complete the Arrow of Light will also participate in the Arrow of Light ceremony.

We also hold pack hikes, fishing trips and other events.

Uniforms & Handbooks

Cub Scouts should wear their uniforms to Den & Pack Meetings and other official scouting events.

Lion Scouts should wear their lions T-shirt and hat.

Tigers and above wear their uniform shirt, neckerchief, hat, belt (belt loops will be added as earned) and any blue pants or shorts depending on weather.

Webelos Scouts wear Scouts, BSA style uniform, which includes Tan shirt with patches and webelos color ribbon, green pants, scout belt (with belt loops), webelos neckerchief and hat.

Scouts should also bring their handbook for their rank to den meetings to get badge requirements signed off and use for activities.



Uniforms – Badge and Award Placements



Webelos & AOL Uniforms



Webelos may wear their cub scout belt or a scout belt without adventure loops.

Webelos may continue to wear regular cub scout uniform until they gain rank.

If you are buying a new shirt and your scout is in fourth grade, we recommend moving to tan shirt then.

Badges

- You will need to purchase the world crest and ring, council shoulder patch and pack numbers (336) for your scout's uniform. The US Flag normally comes on the shirt.
- These are the assigned Den numbers for 2022-2023 school year. Scout dens advance in August or September to the new rank year.
 - Den #1 for Lions (Kindergarten)
 - Den #6 for Tigers (1st Grade)
 - Den #5 for Wolves(2nd Grade
 - Den #2 for Bears (3rd Grade)
 - Den #3 for Webelos (4th Grade)
 - Den #4 for Arrow of Light (5th Grade)
- We will provide the Rank (left pocket) and Activity (right pocket) badges throughout the year as the are earned. Some den leaders provide their den patches.
- You can purchase shirts with badges attached at Scout Shop or use Badge Magic for a quick way to add patches without sewing.  - All leaders are required to take Youth Protection Training (YPT) which is done online at My.Scouting.org. (~45-60 minutes)
 - I encourage all Lion & Tiger parents to take it regardless of whether you wish to volunteer as a leader.
- Scoutbook <u>https://scoutbook.scouting.org/</u> is also available as an app for both iPhone and Android devices. Scoutbook allows parents to see their scouts advancements and connect to their den leaders. Den leaders can also use scoutbook to send text and email messages.

Ranks, Activities and Awards

Lions work on their Lions adventures (Lions now have belt loops) to earn their Lions Badge (bar shaped).

All scouts that are Tiger and above start by earning Bobcat rank then work on the appropriate rank for their grade. Scouts typically earn one rank each grade. To earn each of the rank badges, cub scouts complete 5-6 required plus 1 elective adventure loops for each rank. Scouts can earn as many electives as they like.

Webelos and Arrow of Light (AOL) Candidates earn adventure pins that go on the webelos colors (ribbon) worn on their shoulder.

Cub Scouts are encouraged to do their best on adventure requirements, they don't have to cover every single requirement to earn it. We typically have at least two opportunities to earn the required adventures for rank each year.

The Bobcat badge requirements are to:

- · Learn and say the Scout Oath, with help if needed.
- · Learn and say the Scout Law, with help if needed.
- · Show the Cub Scout sign. Tell what it means.
- · Show the Cub Scout handshake. Tell what it means.
- · Say the Cub Scout motto. Tell what it means.
- · Show the Cub Scout salute. Tell what it means.
- Complete the exercises in the pamphlet How to Protect Your Children From Child Abuse: A
 Parent's Guide with a parent or guardian.

The Scout Law

Meaning of Scout Law - A Scout is:

- *TRUSTWORTHY.* Tell the truth and keep promises. People can depend on you.
- LOYAL. Show that you care about your family, friends, fellow scouts/scout leaders, school, and country.
- HELPFUL. Volunteer to help others without expecting a reward.
- FRIENDLY. Be a friend to everyone, even people who are very different from you.
- COURTEOUS. Be polite to everyone and always use good manners.
- KIND. Treat others as you want to be treated. Never harm or kill any living thing without good reason.
- OBEDIENT. Follow the rules of your family, school, and pack. Obey the laws of your community and country.
- CHEERFUL. Look for the bright side of life. Cheerfully do tasks that come your way. Try to help others be happy.
- THRIFTY. Work to pay your own way. Try not to be wasteful. Use time, food, supplies, and natural resources wisely.
- BRAVE. Face difficult situations even when you feel afraid. Do what you think is right despite what others
 might be doing or saying.
- CLEAN. Keep your body and mind fit. Help keep your home and community clean.
- REVERENT. Be reverent toward God. Be faithful in your religious duties. Respect the beliefs of others.

Cub Scout Sign

Why:

- The two fingers stand for the two parts of the Cub Scout Promise: "to help other people" and "to obey."
- They look like a wolf's ears ready to listen to "Akela."

Cub Scout Handshake



Why:

- Hold out your right hand to shake, then put your two fingers along the inside of the other boys wrist.
 - This means that you help each other to remember and obey the Scout Oath and Scout Law

Cub Scout Salute

Why:

- You salute the flag to show respect to our country for the Pledge of Allegiance.
- Touch your fingertips to your right eyebrow or cap

When:

 Give the Cub Scout salute when you are in your Cub Scout uniform, indoors and out doors

How we keep your children safe



BSA YOUTH PROTECTION PROGRAM

The Boy Scouts of America strives to prevent child abuse through a comprehensive program, which includes:

- Mandatory Youth Protection training
- Formal leader selection process
- Criminal background checks
- Barriers to Abuse
- Mandatory reporting
- Volunteer screening database system

Two Deep Rule: The two deep rule states that no individual scout should ever be alone with a leader without another adult/leader to witness that interaction. The only exception is if that leader is also the scout's parent acting as a parent.

All communications from us or any official BSA communication MUST have at least 2 leaders/adults copied on that communication.
